In addition, the journal seeks submissions for its new in-brief sections: archives, databases, debates, overviews and trends. It also publishes research notes and solicited book reviews.

Although the journal's readership is primarily sociologists, it also seeks to appeal to – and welcomes submissions from – scholars in other social science disciplines including anthropology, geography, politics, social policy, social work, and social care.
