

In the UK, we discard 2 million tonnes of electronic equipment and send 350,000 tonnes of clothing into UK landfills per year. Taking ImaginationLancaster's **Repair Shop 2049**, and Power to Connect and UAL's Creative Computing Institute's **Digital Equity through E-Waste Reduction** scheme, we ask how design can create models for reuse and repair not only at a product level, but sustainably restore at a social and economic scale.



SPEAKERS

Justin McGuirk, Director of <u>Future Observatory</u> and Chief Curator of the <u>Design Museum</u>

Justin McGuirk is Chief Curator and Director of Future Observatory at the Design Museum. In a diverse career, he has edited magazines, been a newspaper critic, founded a digital publishing house and been awarded the Golden Lion at the Venice Biennale for his curating. He was also the founding Head of the Design Curating & Writing MA at Design Academy Eindhoven and is the author/editor of several books, including Radical Cities (Verso, 2014).

<u>Professor Nick Dunn</u>, Executive Director of <u>ImaginationLancaster</u> and Chair of Urban Design at Lancaster University

Nick Dunn is Executive Director of Imagination and Professor of Urban Design at Lancaster. His research into urban futures has been funded by the AHRC, EPSRC, the UK's Government Office for Science and the Ministry of Defence. He has authored numerous books, curated exhibitions, and given talks at public festivals and conferences around the world.

Professor Jennie Popay, Director of Lancaster University's <u>Centre for Health Inequalities Research</u>

Jennie is Distinguished Professor of Sociology and Public Health at Lancaster University, having previously worked as a teacher, policy maker and researcher in the UK, East Africa and New Zealand, studying the structural determinants of health inequalities and the role of community empowerment in action to address these. She is currently developing a new programme of research to deliver evidence for greater health equity in the English School for Public Health Research.

Cher Potter, Curatorial Director of <u>Future Observatory</u> at the Design Museum

Cher Potter is Curatorial Director of Future Observatory at the Design Museum. Previously, she was Senior Research Fellow in 'Design Futures' at the Victoria and Albert Museum, investigating emerging design responses to large-scale social and environmental change (2013-2021) and ran the Creative Direction at WGSN trend forecasting bureau (2008-2013).

Irtiza Nasar, Senior Lecturer at the University of the Arts London's Creative Computing Institute

Irtiza Nasar is an artist, designer, and researcher. His practice explores the politics of upcoming technologies and questioning the mechanisms

of an algorithmically driven society. His current research examines the intersection of computational social science and behavioural economics and focuses on data and its impact on societies and individuals. He is a Senior Lecturer at UAL: Creative Computing Institute and a Senior visiting Lecturer at Imperial College London.

<u>Dr Michael Stead</u>, Principal Investigator of ImaginationLancaster's <u>The Repair Shop 2049</u>

Micheal Stead is a Lecturer in Sustainable Design Futures at Lancaster University. Michael's current research critically and creatively explores the growing environmental and social impacts that so-called 'smart' technologies pose for achieving important globally recognised sustainability goals. He is developing new design approaches and tools in collaboration with industry, policymakers and publics which raise awareness and support the adoption of future sustainable and equitable data-driven technologies and related practices.

<u>Danielle Purkiss</u>, Research Fellow at the UCL Plastic Waste Innovation Hub and Institute of Making

Danielle Purkiss is an Architect, Research Fellow and Manager at UCL's Plastic Waste Innovation Hub and the Institute of Making where she leads Citizen Science and material systems research. She is co-founder of the UCL Big Repair Project, studying the repairability of home appliances and electronics across the UK.

Akil Scafe-Smith, Co-founder of RESOLVE Collective

Akil Scafe-Smith is one fifth of interdisciplinary design collective RESOLVE, a researcher for the London School of Economics, a trustee at Participatory City and has taught at Central Saint Martins and Greenwich University. Akil has a background in urban design and is a Public Practice alumnus. As part of RESOLVE, Akil is currently unit leader at the AA and a resident creative youth worker at the V&A East/VARI in London.

Melissa Mean, Director of We Can Make

Melissa Mean is founding Director of WeCanMake and works across urbanism, the arts, technology and public participation. She was Head of the Cities Programme at the think tank Demos in London, Head of Arts at Knowle West Media Centre in Bristol a commissioner on the "No Place Left Behind" Commission into Prosperity and Community Place-Making (2021). Melissa is a Trustee of Power to Change, and was and co-convener of the Redcliffe Forum.

Amahra Spence, Co-founder and Creative Director of MAIA

Amahra Spence is an artist, organiser, systems designer and spatial practitioner. In all aspects of her work, Amahra contends with Black Imagination as a framework and the starting point for change. As Founding Director of MAIA (2013) and Organiser of The Black Land & Spatial Justice Project (2020), Amahra brings a critical analysis of systemic injustice and power, committing to infrastructure building, resource redistribution and platforming radical imagination.

Laurie Peake is Director of Super Slow Way arts programme in Pennine Lancashire and the British Textile Biennial, working with artists in communities along the Leeds & Liverpool Canal in East Lancashire, using its rich environmental and heritage assets to support community led regeneration and climate action.

Immy Kaur is Co Founder and Director of CIVIC SQUARE. Dr Serena Pollastri, Principal Investigator of Lancaster University's Morecambe Bay Timescapes


